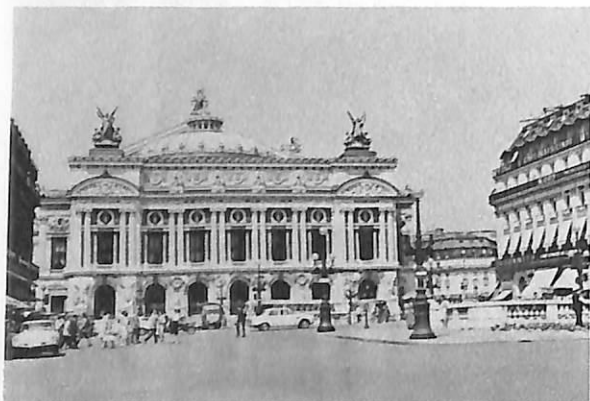

Alumni Association Reorganized 10-Member Board Appointed

The St. Norbert College Alumni Association has been reorganized with the appointment of a 10-member Alumni Board of Directors. The new board replaces a four-member national officer slate and consists of standing committees for alumni awards, continuing education, student relations, reunions-homecoming and local alumni clubs.

Named to head the reorganized alumni board was Herb E. Hoeft '55, immediate past president of the Alumni Association. Hoeft is president of the Christensen Oil Company in Green Bay and past vice-president of the Optimist Club. He is also a member of the Green Bay Elks Club, YMCA and the school board of Resurrection Parish in Allouez.

Other members of the board and their assignments include:

Quentin F. Willems '41, secretary-treasurer of The Larsen Company in Green Bay, (alumni awards).

Catherine A. Schmitz '56, a fourth grade teacher in Ashwaubenon, and James Nys '54, superintendent of schools for the Howard-Suamico School District, (continuing education).

Mrs. Barbara Tobias Stenger '61, housewife and former teacher, and James W. Burke '65, a wholesaler with the Pioneer Distributing Company, (student relations).

James W. Ritchay '55, an accountant with Fort Howard Steel and Wire, and James W. Lang '35, editor and president of the Kaukauna Times Printing Company, (reunions-homecoming).

Robert G. Van Dyck '57, a salesman with the Bradner Smith & Company Paper Distributor, (local clubs).

William Hinkfuss '54, an attorney, (member-at-large).

Wayne Vander Putten, director of alumni relations for the College, said the 10-member board would eventually be expanded to include a wider geographic representation. The Board will stress the involvement and participation of alumni in activities designed to generate interest in the growth and development of St. Norbert College.

A new constitution for the Association has been completed and is hereby submitted to the entire alumni membership for ratification. (Cont. on page 11)



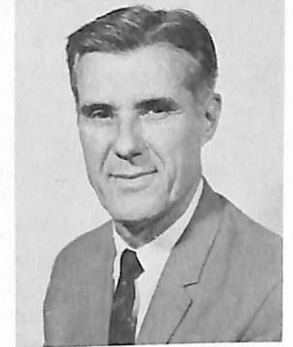

NEW BYLAWS WILL GUIDE ST. NORBERT COLLEGE

A new set of bylaws, designed to serve as a blueprint for the operation of St. Norbert College, has been revealed by college officials.

Meyer M. Cohen, chairman of the Board of Trustees, said the 16 article document revises and restates responsibilities of the Board of Trustees and defines the duties of the college president, chancellor and those of other administrators and faculty members at the college. "There was no provision in the old bylaws for the Board of Trustees, for instance, and its position in the college," Cohen said. "And there had to be major revisions in the duties of the president of the college and of the chancellor," Cohen added.

The Board of Trustees has been working on the new set of bylaws since the Board was formed in August of 1966 as a predominantly lay board, Cohen said.

In effect, the bylaws give governing power of the college to the Board of Trustees, and set board membership at a minimum of five and a maximum of 11, two members of which must be appointed from the Norbertine Order by the Abbot. Should membership exceed seven, the board must invite the Abbot to appoint another Order member if the Abbot so desires.

The two Norbertines now on the seven member board are the Rev. Isadore M. Gosz, vice-chairman, and the Rev. Timothy A. Reilley, secretary.

Non-order members on the board include E. L. Everson, who like Cohen, is a Green Bay attorney, Mrs. Fred H. Lindner and Mrs. Mary Walter, both of De Pere, and William H. Fieweger, a Kimberly-Clark Corporation executive. Non-order, or lay members, are appointed by the Abbot following nomination by a two-thirds vote of all the members of the board.

There were five members when the Board of Trustees was reconstituted in 1966. Since then, Mrs. Lindner and Fieweger have been added. Terms of office for lay members are five years and expire on May 1 of the applicable year. Terms of office for Norbertines are set by the Abbot and may be indefinite.

Continuity of membership

To insure a continuity of membership, however, terms of office for some lay members of the board were made shorter than the normal five years. Everson recently was reappointed for a five year term when his two year term expired this month. Cohen's term expires in 1969, Mrs. Walter's in 1970 and Mrs. Lindner's in 1971. Fieweger was appointed for a full five year term expiring in 1973.

"The new bylaws give the Board of Trustees full power to operate the college with one or two exceptions," Cohen said. He noted that the board needs approval of the Abbot's Council to incur any financial obligations maturing more than a year from the date they are incurred, and also to incur debts in excess of a million dollars maturing one year or less from the date they are incurred."

"We must have the Abbot's approval for appointment of a president and we must have, and did get, approval of the Abbot's Council for the bylaws or any changes in the bylaws. Except for that, the Board of Trustees has full power over policies and direction of the college," Cohen said.

Specific powers of the Board of Trustees, as spelled out in the new bylaws, include authority to:

- *Select a president of the college subject to Abbot's approval.
- *Grant degrees.
- *Select, with advice and assistance of the president, members of the Board of Administration.
- *Enact rules and regulations pertaining to the faculty, curriculum and establishment or deletion or new majors and academic programs as the board may determine.
- *Determine all financial matters subject to the two exceptions previously mentioned.
- *Accept or refuse conditional gifts, grants or other bequests made to the college.

The new bylaws also define the responsibilities of the College Chancellor, who is the Very Rev. Dennis M. Burke, retired from the president's office since April 15 of this year. The Chancellor, an ex-officio member of the Board of Governors of the college, will be available to advise the Board of Trustees and Board of Administration, in matters affecting the welfare of the college. "It is desirable that he establish and maintain close consultative liaison with the President in order to promote public appreciation and acceptance of the College and to enlist financial support for its activities," the bylaw further states.

The Chancellor is responsible only to the Board of Trustees. (Cont. on page 9)

"LOOK, SEE, HEAR" SEEKS \$66,000 FROM ALUMNI

"Look, See, Hear" means better resources for St. Norbert College students.

That's the idea behind the 1968 Annual Alumni Fund which seeks \$66,000 from St. Norbert College alumni.

The slogan, "Look, See, Hear," refers to reference books for the Joseph M. Conway Memorial Library (Look), a video tape recorder available to all academic departments (See), and a new language laboratory for the modern languages department (Hear). It is a way of offering St. Norbert College alumni a choice of three areas needing alumni support. The "Look, See, Hear" drive will be compressed into the last four months of 1968 with special emphasis placed on each of the areas in October, November and December.

The \$66,000 figure includes \$21,000 for reference books, \$30,000 for a new language laboratory and \$15,000 for a video tape recorder.

Project "Look" offers alumni a chance to donate reference books to the Joseph M. Conway Memorial Library. The "Look" project is being emphasized

During November Project "See," the drive to buy a video tape recorder, will be emphasized to all alumni. A majority of the college's 21 academic departments will be able to use a video tape recorder to record such things as scientific demonstrations, lectures by professors and guest speakers, student performances and practice teachings plus new ideas in teaching and learning.

A total of \$15,000 is being sought from alumni for the video tape recorder. In addition, parents of St. Norbert College students have been asked to provide the remainder in a special fund drive.

HOMECOMING ACTIVITIES EXPANDED

Homecoming has taken on a new look at St. Norbert College this year. In addition to the traditional class reunions, football game, fifth quarter dinner and dance, two other affairs have been tied in to the weekend of October 18-20.

The College theater department will present "The Lady's Not for Burning" at 8:15 p.m. Friday in the Hall of Fine Arts. The three-act comedy involves a disillusioned young 15th century soldier who wants to be hanged but finds that red tape prevents it.

The Speakers Forum has scheduled an address by alumnus Robert Hoyt '42 for 2:00 p.m. Sunday. Editor of the National Catholic Reporter, Hoyt will discuss the Catholic press.

Hoyt's address will be followed by informal talks between St. Norbert departmental chairmen and alumni. Tours of the new Dr. John R. Minahan Science Hall will be conducted.

The traditional class reunions will begin Friday night with a cocktail hour and dinner for the Classes of 1918 and 1943 which are celebrating their 50th and 25th anniversaries.

The Class of 1958 will hold a Communion-Brunch at 9:30 Saturday morning and those members who are in the Green Bay area Friday night will meet informally at the Town & Country Club.

Members of the Class of 1963 who return Friday night will gather informally at Buck's.

Saturday's Homecoming festivities begin with the parade at noon from the campus to Minahan Stadium, followed by the football game against Oshkosh State University at 1:30 p.m.

The annual Alma Mater Award presentations will be made at halftime of the football game.

The Alumni fifth quarter starts at 6:00 p.m., the dinner at 7:00 p.m. and the dance at 9:00 p.m.

Ticket information and other details on reunions and Homecoming have already been mailed from the Alumni Office.

COLLEGE ADOPTS RECORD BUDGET

A record budget, totaling \$4,312,063, has been adopted at St. Norbert College for fiscal year 1968-69. The new budget is \$581,573 more than last year.

The bulk of the 1968-69 outlay will go for educational and general disbursements, which will total \$2,604,423 this school year. Of that figure, \$1,371,881 is expended for faculty salaries and departmental research while the remainder goes for general administration, student services, public services and information, organized research, library and operation and maintenance of the physical plant.

Salary increases and a maturing faculty were cited by Dr. Neil J. Webb, acting president, as among key reasons for the budget increase. The college also has allocated \$174,249 for the operation of the Joseph M. Conway Memorial Library this year, Webb said. That figure is more than \$41,000 higher than last year's outlay and represents a continuing effort to keep library standards high at the college.

Webb also cited additions to the college staff, additional funds for scholarships and grants and a decrease in the contributed services of religious and priests in relations to enrollment as other factors involved in the budget increase.

Programmed deficit

For the first time, the budget includes a programmed deficit totalling \$223,700. According to William C. Van Dyk, director of college relations, "This is a departure from the present procedure of programming a balanced budget by allocating expected gift money in advance of its receipt. This system of planning a programmed deficit will present to our public a true picture of the cost of operating the college," Van Dyk said. "It also will automatically establish a priority objective for the development office for the annual fund," he added. Van Dyk's office has charge of development activities at the college.

The bulk of this year's budget — 70 per cent — is realized through student tuition and fees. This has been a consistent average for the past eight years. Van Dyk noted, however, that though the 70 per cent figure is higher than national averages of comparable colleges, it does not mean St. Norbert College tuition is higher than others. "Our tuition has been generally lower than colleges similar to us," he said. "We have accomplished this by maintaining an austere budget that is founded on a deep sense of fiscal responsibility, sound planning and good management techniques."

With student fees and tuition representing 70 per cent of the college's income, the remaining 30 per cent, in effect, represents a subsidy of \$750 per student, Van Dyk said. Of this 30 per cent, 25 to 27 per cent is derived from endowed funds and other sources. Endowed funds, though relatively meager, provide income to assist qualified needy students obtain an education. The contributed services of the Norbertine faculty members also greatly assist the college to reduce its cost in this area of the budget.

"Not only do student fees fail to provide for current cost of education," Van Dyk continued, "but with the exception of dormitories and the dining hall they do not provide for the cost of the facilities in which edu-

KNIGHTS TO PLAY 24-GAME BASKETBALL SCHEDULE

Going into their 11th season under coach Romie Kosnar, the Green Knights have a 24-game basketball schedule for the 1968-69 campaign.

The Knights open the season November 30 against Mount St. Paul in Waukesha with the first home game in Van Dyke Gym set for December 2 against Northland College.

Four of Kosnar's five starting players on the 1967-68 Knight basketball team will return this season, Kosnar said, giving the squad a lot of depth. The returning starters include center Lee Steffanus, forwards Jack Gebler and Tom Rankin and guard Joe Emer.

Other returnees include reserve guards Pat Callahan and Bob Grignon and forwards Tim Monteen and Greg Frederick. Gebler, who will be a junior, finished last season as leading scorer and rebounder and was voted most valuable player by his teammates.

Kosnar also expects he'll get some help from newcomers Wayne Nash and Steve Danen. Nash is a 6-4 freshman from Milwaukee Messmer High School and Danen, 6-4, is a transfer student who played for East De Pere High School.

Last year the Knights posted a 9-13 record overall and finished last in the five-team Midlands Conference.

17 NEW FACULTY MEMBERS, MAJORITY HAS DOCTORATE

A total of 17 new faculty members took their places in classrooms when the 1968-69 college year began. The majority holds doctorate degrees and most have had considerable experience, either in teaching or in their particular field of interest, according to Dr. Neil J. Webb, acting president of St. Norbert.

The hiring of senior staff members is "part of a concerted campaign to add to the college faculty more outstanding teacher-scholars," Webb said. "The quality of the faculty is the key to the quality of the college," he said.

John Bennett, for example, is a full professor of English who comes to St. Norbert College with 20 years' teaching experience at schools including Rockford College, Rockford, Ill., his last assignment, and at the University of Wisconsin at Madison. Bennett is the editor of the Beloit Poetry Journal and has published one book of poems and is working on a second.

Many of his poems have been included in anthologies, the latest being "On D. H. Lawrence and His Snake," which will appear in "Best Poems of 1967," the 20th annual volume of Borestone Mountain Poetry Awards.

Bennett received his bachelor's degree from Oberlin College, Oberlin, Ohio, and his master's and doctor's degrees from the University of Wisconsin.

Special experience

A Marist Brother and an Augustinian priest, the first of their orders to teach at St. Norbert will bring special experience to the campus. cation takes place such as the library, the classrooms or the laboratories. In order to continue to serve a major portion of students seeking entrance to the college, we must engage in a continued program of expansion. Our present plant is at capacity with enrollments increasing each year.

"Gifts by individual donors, foundations, or corporate and commercial organizations are placed into the building program. Several buildings on the St. Norbert College campus bear the names of these generous donors," Van Dyk said.

"The programmed deficit of three to five per cent of the budget must be provided by college constituencies and other sources," Van Dyk said. "The St. Norbert College Alumni Association, the Parents Fund, unrestricted gifts from foundations, corporations and friends of the college provide funds to offset the ever-increasing deficit.

"Tuition and fees, endowment, auxiliary enterprises and contributed services do not provide sufficient funds to balance the budget and gifts from concerned donors are needed in this area," Van Dyk said.

The overall effect of bylaws regarding the president is a sharing of authority with the Board of Trustees. Under the old bylaws, the Abbot appointed the president and had authority to set term of office, while the new bylaws direct the Board of Trustees to appoint the president subject to the Abbot's approval. The president's tenure of office is subject to the Board of Trustees. The new bylaws also direct the president to delegate to the members of the Board of Administration responsibility for the operation of educational, business, personnel and development functions of the college, reserving for himself the primary responsibility for unified and executive direction.

The president also must submit for approval to the Board of Trustees major fund raising programs and building plans not included in the already approved annual budget.

In addition to defining the responsibilities of the Board of Governors, college administrators and faculty members, the bylaws include a revised set of goals and objectives written by a college committee comprised of two students, one alumnus, three faculty members and the college dean and administrative vice-president. A final draft was approved by the Board of Administration, Board of Trustees and the Abbot's Council. According to Dr. Neil J. Webb, acting president, the new goals and objectives of St. Norbert College "basically reaffirm our commitment as a religiously oriented institution. At the same time I think it shows us new ways of actualizing this commitment."

The new goals state that as a religiously oriented institution, St. Norbert College "seeks the exercise of intellect in the presence of conscience. The college is organized to encourage the highest academic standards in a context of Judeo-Christian faith."

Other goals and objectives:

"St. Norbert intends to remain a small college, flexible and willing to experiment and discover new ideas."

"The objective of the St. Norbert program is a generally educated person who is also adequately prepared in an area of special interest. He is an individual keenly aware of his responsibilities to others as well as his rights as a free man. St. Norbert asks its students not to withdraw from society, but to participate actively in it. On campus there is a deep concern for moral and social values and a theological commitment that displays itself as a perceptible quality of college life."

"Every student who comes to St. Norbert should leave the college a dynamic, informed, moral citizen, able and willing to take a place in the world of the twentieth century."

Project "Hear," a drive to provide funds for the purchase of a new language laboratory, will be stressed during December. A total of \$30,000 is being sought from alumni for project "Hear."

The new language laboratory replaces a 30-booth laboratory installed in 1961 for 900 language students studying French, German and Spanish. Since 1961, a fourth language (Russian) has been added and student population has hovered around 1,700, making the laboratory one of the most urgent needs of the modern language department.

The language laboratory is located on the second floor of Boyle Hall and has been in use since September, 1968.

In addition, alumni who desire may designate that their gifts be applied to the College Building Fund for facilities on campus.

RECORD ENROLLMENT IN '68-'69

A record enrollment of 1,739 students was reported at St. Norbert College this Fall by William F. Harrison, college registrar. The figure includes a record freshman class of 517.

Last year the college had a total enrollment of 1,714 students.

This year's enrollment of 1,739 includes a total on-campus population of 1,600 students, 96 more than a year ago. Part-time and affiliated students account for the remainder of the 1,739 total.

The college's eight residence halls, with a total capacity of 1,200, are full this year. Acting President Neil J. Webb said that dormitories had been reserved to capacity since last spring and said that because of lack of space it was "regretful that we had to turn down so many qualified applicants." Dr. Webb added, "We are particularly pleased, however, that pressure to gain admission to St. Norbert College is increasing at a time when some private colleges are faced with declining enrollments."

The total enrollment figure of 1,739 includes 950 men and 789 women. A geographic breakdown of the student population shows that Brown County accounts for the greatest number of students with 392. Runner-up counties and the number of students they supplied included Milwaukee (162), Outagamie (89), Waukesha (52), Racine (45), Fond du Lac (35) and Winnebago (25).

The largest number of out-of-state students comes from Illinois, which supplied 413 students to the college this year with 347 students last year. Next is Minnesota (19), Iowa (12), and Pennsylvania (8).

Farrell Appointed

Richard J. Farrell, Jr., a 1967 graduate of St. Norbert College, has been named director of industrial placement at the college to succeed Clifford Boulet, now retired from the post.

Up to his appointment, Farrell served as assistant director of admissions and as associate director of industrial placement. He also has been named moderator of the 1969 college yearbook, the "Des Peres."

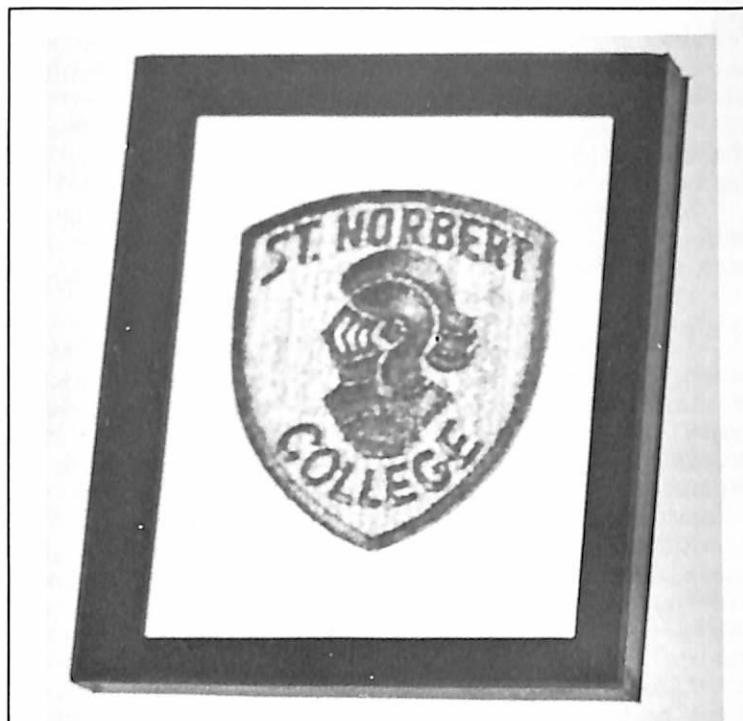
Farrell is a member of the Midwest College Placement Association, the Manpower Advisory Committee in Green Bay, and of Sigma Tau Gamma fraternity.

mental in organizing a special Ranger unit from ROTC ranks at St. Norbert.

FATHER BURKE LAUDED

Chancellor Burke has also served as president and board member of the Wisconsin Foundation of Independent Colleges. He is also a past president of the Wisconsin Association of Presidents and Deans from Institutions of Higher Learning."

"I am proud to say that it has been my privilege to work closely with Father Burke and count him as a friend."

Byrnes finished his remarks by reading into the record an editorial written about Father Burke in the Green Bay Press-Gazette.

St. Norbert College Alumni Association CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I: Name and Office

Section 1. The name of the organization shall be the St. Norbert College Alumni Association.

Section 2. The principal office of this Association shall be located in the office of the Director of Alumni Relations, St. Norbert College, West De Pere, Wisconsin.

ARTICLE II: Purpose

Section 1. The purpose of the Association shall be to promote the interests of St. Norbert College and to establish closer relations between the College and its Alumni, and the Association shall have all powers necessary to accomplish this purpose.

ARTICLE III: Membership

Section 1. Membership includes all those former students who have completed one year at St. Norbert College and whose class has graduated from St. Norbert College.

ARTICLE IV: Board of Directors

Section 1. The management and government of the affairs of this Association shall be vested in a Board of Directors which shall consist of elected active members.

Section 2. Each Director shall hold office for a term of three (3) years or until a successor is elected and takes office. Four Directors shall be elected each year.

Section 3. A Director may resign at any time by filing his written resignation with the Executive Secretary of this Association. If any vacancy shall occur on the Board of Directors, the Board of Directors shall fill such vacancy for the unexpired portion of the term in which the vacancy occurs.

ARTICLE V: Standing Committees

Section 1. There shall be five (5) standing committees:

1. Alumni Awards
2. Continuing Education
3. Student Relations
4. Reunions & Homecoming
5. Local Alumni Clubs

Section 2. Standing Committee Chairmen shall be appointed by the President and approved by the Board of Directors and the Chairman shall be a member of the Board of Directors.

Section 3. Members of the Standing Committees shall be selected from the Association by the President and approved by the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE VI: Meetings of the Board of Directors

Section 1. The Board of Directors shall meet periodically during the year to transact business of the Association, including the Annual Fall Meeting.

Section 2. Special meetings of the Board of Directors may be called by the President or upon

written request to the Executive Secretary by five (5) Directors.

Section 3. Written or printed notice of every meeting of the Board of Directors, in such form as the Executive Secretary shall determine, stating the time, place, and in the case of special meetings, the purpose of such special meeting, shall be mailed or delivered personally to each Director at his address as it appears on the mailing list of the Executive Secretary not less than ten (10) day prior to the scheduled date of such meeting.

Section 4. At any meeting of the Board of Directors, those present shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of any business.

ARTICLE VII: Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be a President, two (2) Vice-Presidents and an Executive Secretary. The President and Vice-Presidents shall be elected by and from the Board of Directors at the annual fall meeting. The President and Vice-Presidents shall hold office for a term of two years. The Executive Secretary shall be the person designated by St. Norbert College as the Director of Alumni Relations or, if none, the person responsible for and performing a like function.

Section 2. The President shall preside over all meetings of this Association and of the Board of Directors and perform all other acts and duties usually performed by an executive and presiding officer. The Vice-Presidents shall perform such duties as may from time to time be assigned to them by the Board of Directors. In the absence or disability of the President, one of the Vice-Presidents shall perform the duties of the President. The Executive Secretary shall keep a complete record of all meetings of the members, the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee of this Association and shall have general charge and supervision of the funds, books and records of this Association. The Executive Secretary shall serve all notices of meetings required by this Constitution, and perform such other duties as may from time to time be prescribed by the Board of Directors.

Section 3. Vacancies in any office shall be filled by the President and the person so appointed shall hold office for the unexpired portion of the term in which such vacancy occurs.

ARTICLE VIII: Elections

Section 1. The President shall appoint a committee of three (3) active members who shall nominate candidates for the Board of Directors and Officers of this Association.

Section 2. Four (4) members of the Alumni Board of Directors shall be elected annually by ballot mailed to all alumni in September. New members take office at Homecoming.

Section 3. The Officers of the Association will be elected by ballot by and from the members of the Alumni Board at the fall meeting.

ARTICLE IX: Amendments

Section 1. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any regular or special meeting of the Board of Directors by the affirmative vote of a majority of the Directors present at such meeting.

Section 2. Upon adoption of this Constitution any previous Constitutions in existence, are hereby rescinded.
