1969 | Year of Inauguration

St. Norbert College is now in its "Year of Inauguration" which will culminate in the spring of 1970 with the inauguration of a new president. The president will succeed the Very Reverend D. M. Burke, who resigned in June of 1968 to become college chancellor.

"The idea is that the new president will be on campus for at least a full academic year preceding his official inauguration, giving him a chance to become well acquainted with St. Norbert College," Dr. Neil J. Webb, acting president, explained.

There are 40 persons being considered for the president's post, Dr. Webb said. They are from all parts of the United States and are both religious and lay persons now holding high positions in private and public education.

Trustees approved the "Year of Inauguration"

after a suggestion by the Rev. Francis Dorff who is chairman of the faculty and of the theology department. In his proposal, Father Dorff said that the Inaugural Year would serve to consolidate the college community and to constitute an "inauguration" or "a new beginning" for the college. Father Dorff said that the college has entered a completely new phase of its existence as the result of the developments of the past three years.

Dr. Webb said the college endorsed the idea because "it gives us a chance to take a look at proposed changes before we let them happen. We can also examine changes which already have occurred. With an inauguration plan we could realistically evaluate this new phase and make its direction explicit to both the college community and those outside the college upon whom we depend for support."

Changes Include Tuition Increase

Several policy changes at St. Norbert College will go into effect at the beginning of the 1969-70 college year. They include a tuition increase, return to the semester system, relaxation of regulations on off campus housing and limitation of future resident freshman classes.

The tuition increase will be \$150 a year, boosting annual tuition from the current \$1,250 to \$1,400 a year. The present amount of \$900 a year for room and board will remain the same.

Dr. Neil J. Webb, acting college president, said that "rapidly rising costs of higher education" were primarily responsible for the tuition increase, in particular, instructional costs. "To keep pace with other institutions," Dr. Webb explained, "we must continue to increase faculty salaries. There are also other fixed costs such as building maintenance and building debt service which cannot be reduced."

Acknowledging that the tuition increase would present "a severe financial burden" to many families, Dr. Webb said that friends of the college and government agencies recently had combined to increase the financial aid resources of the college. "This year we have 842 students receiving financial aid as compared with 451 in 1967," he said. "The total financial aid given from all sources has risen from \$750,000 last year to \$1,008,000 in 1968." Dr. Webb said the college expected the amount of aid to increase even more next year and urged every student who had need of aid to investigate the sources of aid available through the College Financial Aids Office.

The return to the semester system of study is the result of a 4-0 vote in favor of semesters with one abstention by the Board of Administration. Faculty members voted by a two to one majority in favor of semesters.

The college dropped semesters in the fall of 1963 in favor of a three-term plan which includes three

10-week terms beginning in September, December and March. The semester beginning in the fall of 1969 will end before Christmas break, Dr. Webb said, eliminating what students and faculty called the "lame duck" period which included final exams after Christmas recess.

Dr. Webb said the college would return to semesters despite some opposition by a committee of students which organized a campaign to retain the three-term system. He said many of the things which the tri-term advocates favored, such as adoption of the "4-1-4" academic year and a revision of current curricula, eventually would be adopted. The "4-1-4" school year is similar to the two-semester system. It includes two four-month periods of classroom work divided by a one month period of independent study.

Adoption of "4-1-4" would make it feasible for St. Norbert to establish cooperative programs with the University of Wisconsin-Green Bay which has adopted the system.

Also, beginning in the Fall, single students 21 years or older will be permitted to live in approved housing off campus anywhere in the Green Bay area. Formerly, only single students over 23 were permitted to live off campus.

One of the chief reasons for the change was that all college residence halls have been filled this year and are expected to be at capacity for at least the next five years.

The Board of Trustees has announced that future resident freshman classes will be limited to 215 men and 215 women. According to Meyer H. Cohen, chairman of the board, the action was taken because of space limitations and to "increase the quality of the freshman class."

Cohen said that in the future the college would tighten up its policy on admitting transfer students and on readmitting former students.

Alumnus Co-Authors Earthquake Theory

Dr. Ramon E. Bisque, a 1953 chemistry graduate of St. Norbert College, is the co-author of a new theory that explains how and why earthquakes happen. Currently chairman of the chemistry department at the Colorado School of Mines, Golden, Colorado, Dr. Bisque did all of his postgraduate work at Iowa State University, earning a Ph.D. in geology and chemistry and two master's degrees, one in geology, the other in chemistry.

The new earthquake theory maintains that quakes originate where the molten core of the earth meets the earth's solid mantle some 1,800 miles below the surface. Graduate student George Rouse started work on the theory after puzzling over the unexplained fact that deep earthquake zones angle into the earth at an average of 60 degrees from the horizontal.

Rouse then tried projecting this dip on an imaginary plane intersecting a toy globe, and found that such a plane was not only tangent to the core of the earth, but emerged as a circle that touched over earthquake zones. Using this process with other earthquake zones, Rouse found that the intersections of these belts coincided with particularly active volcanic zones.

Rouse, who then was a graduate student under Dr. Bisque, took his findings to Bisque and both worked on the project further. They theorized that the core-tangent planes were probably stress planes generated by twisting of the core in relation to the mantle or vice-versa.

They further postulated that the twisting was caused by an interaction of the metallic core with magnetic fields exerted on the earth by the sun and stars.

Rouse and Bisque discovered that primary mineral deposits, mountains, ocean floor ridges and trenches and island chains also lie along the newly-named "Rouse belts."

Both geochemists devised a simple demonstration of their theory using modeling clay to mold a mantle around a solid core. The core was attached to a spindle that the scientists used to spin their model earth, accelerating it to simulate the effects of tugging magnetic fields. When the modeling compound dried and formed a thin crust, its larger cracks clearly defined major stress planes that were tangent to the core.

The Rouse-Bisque findings have resulted in widespread notice for both men in scientific journals. The magazine *Scientific Research* reported in June that the theory "ties together many of the heretofore fragmented problems that have puzzled geophysicists: Finding a pattern in the seismic zones that crisscross the earth; relating scattered deposits of primary metals to them and to each other, and explaining the mysterious gravity and magnetic anomalies on the earth's surface."

The magazine further reported that the theory conflicted with the now popular "continental drift" theory which many geophysicists have subscribed to in explaining earthquake causes. The "drift" theory holds that continents have been drifting steadily further apart over the centuries and the ensuing stress between moving land mass and shifting ocean bottom has caused the majority of earthquakes.

Bisque, however, says the Rouse-Bisque theory may not be incompatible with the continental drift theory.

Bisque and Rouse were recently among 17 persons in the western states named to "Who's Who in the West." Both were cited "for outstanding contribution to the advancement of their region and to mankind."

Some of Dr. Bisque's activities related to education have included his being chosen to give the Distinguished Lecture Tour of the American Association of Petroleum Geologists. His topic was, "Geology in our Secondary Schools; What Effect on Industry and the Universities?" He also is a member of the board of directors of the American National Center for Educational Research in Boulder, Colorado.

Other activities include membership on a curriculum program panel of the American Geological Institute which aims at initiating curriculum innovations in the geological sciences.

Another of his recent activities was the directing of the Earth Science Curriculum Project, which resulted in the writing of a 594 page science textbook for ninth graders now in use throughout the country. Dr. Bisque did much of the writing for the text.

His outside educational activities include his co-ownership of the firm, Earth Sciences, Incorporated, in Golden, Colorado. The firm specializes in consulting work in mineral exploration.

Dr. Bisque has traveled to Venezuela, Japan, the Philippine Islands and Canada as a mineral consultant. His publications include over a dozen magazine articles on geology in various scientific and educational journals.

Gridders Finish 6-2-1; Several Are Honored

A 7-0, last-minute loss to Hillsdale College, a team which Coach Howie Kolstad says was "the best we faced all year," gave the 1968 Green Knight football team a record of 6-2-1.

During the team's annual banquet, at which Vince Lombardi, general manager of the Green Bay Packers was guest of honor and speaker, Dick Hilger was named captain for the 1969 season, Steve Wilmet was picked as the Most Valuable Player and Mike Teff was selected as the Most Outstanding Freshman player, a new award.

After a fine sophomore year during which he led the team in scoring and was second in rushing, Hilger missed the first half of the 1968 season because of illness. In the last few games of the season he gained 82 yards rushing, scored one touchdown, caught two passes and intercepted one pass.

Wilmet, during his three years as Knight quarterback, passed for 2,912 yards to better the record of Chuck Hoch (1961-64) who tossed for 2,368 yards in four seasons. Although he is an academic senior, Wilmet has a year of football eligibility remaining.

A graduate of Madison Edgewood High School, Teff filled a defensive tackle slot all year. The 6-4, 240 pounder overcame an early season leg injury as well.

Fullback Larry Krause and Wilmet were given honorable mention on the NAIA All-American team. During the '68 season, Wilmet passed for more than 1,000 yards and had only six interceptions.

Krause, a junior, placed sixth in scoring and tied for 25th place in rushing among NAIA colleges. His 102 points during the '68 season tied an all-time Knight mark set by Norm Jarock in 1957. Krause rushed for 890 yards this past season and now has a total of 1,707 yards in three years, approaching the record of 2,358 yards in four seasons by Jarock.
