As we have been informed that, in the church of St. Joseph, in the city of De Pere, of the Diocese of Green Bay, was established an Association of St. Joseph whose members are united in the exercise of pious and charitable works, willing that the aforesaid Association each day increase more and more, trusting in the Mercy of God Almighty, and by the authority of the Apostles SS. Peter and Paul, we grant to all the faithful who henceforth will be admitted into the confraternity, a plenary indulgence on the day of their admission, if being sorry for their sins, they are absolved and receive the holy Communion. We grant also a plenary indulgence, at the hour of death, to all those who have been already admitted or will be hereafter, if with contrite heart they receive absolution and holy communion, or if being unable to do so, they invoke the Holy Name of lesus, at least in their heart, if they cannot speak.

We grant also a plenary indulgence to every member of the Association, who after having received absolution and holy Communion, will piously visit the church of the confraternity or another church or chapel, on the principal Feast of the Association or one of the seven following days, once, at their choice or by appointment of the Bishop; every year under the condition to pray for the concord between Christian princes, for the destruction of heresy, the conversion of sinners and the exaltation of our Holy Mother the Church.
