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## THRS 325: Providence, Suffering, and Freedom

Students in this course examined various possibilities for "making sense" of traditional Christianity's belief in an omnipotent, all loving, providential God in light of contemporary awareness of the tragedy not only of personal suffering but also of social suffering, and of the radicalness of human freedom.
